

Launching the program at the County Headquarters, Governor Kimani Wamatangi announced that, going forward, all streetlights in the county will be solar-powered.

Governor Wamatangi stated that the programme will gradually be extended to health facilities, water projects, county offices and all other county facilities as Kiambu aims to reduce the high cost of power bills.

The ambitious program, dubbed "Angaza Kiambu," promises to usher in a new era of clean and renewable energy in response to the rising cost of electricity

One of the key pillars in Governor Wamatangi's manifesto was "Angaza Kiambu," which spelt out strategies aimed at lighting up our county.

"I promised the great people of Kiambu that we would adopt clean and sustainable energy. I am therefore happy that the moment has arrived," the Governor remarked during the launch of the solar project.

During the launch event, the Governor unveiled 6,000 solar streetlights, which will be installed across the county this month.

Making the case for the adoption of solar energy, Governor Wamatangi explained that the County Government spends about Sh1 billion on electricity

ing over Sh500 million and streetlights consuming Sh210 million per year.

"The high power bills have often led to streetlights being turned off and essential institutions like hospitals and county offices being targeted for disconnections due to unpaid bills," the Governor noted.

He said solar power systems have minimal to zero maintenance costs and no monthly power bills, leading to significant savings.

"These savings can then be allocated to other critical services and development projects, such as the supply of drugs in our hospitals and the construction of key facilities," said

He added: "While we are not completely disconnecting from the Kenya Power grid, we aim to progressively transition to solar energy.'

The Governor challenged Members of the County Assembly and national Parliament to fast tract policy and enactment of law on renewable energy and zero rating wind power respectively as part of securing a brighter and greener future for the County.

Majority Leader Godffrey Mucheke while echoing Wamatangi's sentiments called on Members of Parliament to introduce law and policies that support the call to embrace renewable energy.

Wamatangi while appealing to all stakeholders to support the shift to solar noted that Government agencies like Kura, Kerra, Kenya Power and RE-REC have been putting up streetlights across the County, leaving the burden of bills to the County Government.

This, he noted, has left the County Government with high power bills, occasional disruptions caused by power outages and disconnections due to unpaid bills.

According to the Chief Officer Public Works and Utilities Virginia Kahonge, solar streetlights have a life span of 20 years as compared to grid-connected lights which last a maximum of 5years; they are less prone to vandalism and insect swarming, reliable, efficient and have minimal maintenance cost

County Assembly Sectoral Committee Chair Peter Mburu, the Kamenu Ward MCA, committed to push the passage of the County Supplementary budget which will see the installation of the newly launched 6,000 solar lights by September 2024.

The County has 19,621 grid connected streetlights which culminate into an annual power and maintenance bill of over 260M while 120 hospitals with an estimated annual power bill of 500M

A cost-benefit analysis of the Riu Nderi borehole in Ondiri Kikuyu, which strongly supported switching to solar power, shows savings of Ksh.737,244 over eight months, translating to an impressive 24 percent reduction in costs after solarisation.

County Executive Committee Member RTPWU Mburu Kang'ethe, while supporting the call to embrace solar energy also notes that the savings from abandoning grid will be used to improve County infrastructure.

Solarisation of boreholes set to save costs on power

n the lush green landscapes of Kiambu County, access to clean water has always been a vital concern for the local communities. With the increasing demand for water supply, the Kikuyu Water and Sanitation Company embarked on an innovative project to solarise boreholes in the region. Among these boreholes, Riu 2 was chosen as the pilot site for solarisation.

In July 2020, the solar project was officially commissioned, marking the beginning of a sustainable solution to the water supply challenges faced by the residents of Kiambu County. However, it is worth noting that while Riu 1 and Riu 2 boreholes shared one electricity meter, only Riu 2 borehole was solarised as part of the initial phase of the project.

Jane Murage, the Managing Director of the Kikuyu Water and Sanitation Company, emphasised the significance of this solarisation initiative. She highlighted the importance of

conducting a comprehensive cost-benefit analysis to evaluate the effectiveness of the solarisation project. According to her, the results of the analysis were promising.

"A cost analysis pre and post-solarisation shows a cost saving of Kshs. 737,244 in an 8-month period. This correlates to a 24 percent cost saving," said Jane Murage.

The data collected over the 8-month period revealed substantial cost savings attributed to the solarisation of the Riu 2 borehole. The savings were particularly noticeable during certain months, with December, January, and February showing the highest September. This disparity in savings could be attributed to the varying weather conditions experienced throughout the year.

'During the colder months, such as December, January, and February, the region experienced longer periods of sunshine, which maximised the efficiency of the solar panels. Conversely, the cloudier weather during July, August and September resulted in lower so-

lar energy production, leading to fewer cost savings during these months," said the MD.

Despite these fluctuations, the overall cost savings achieved through solarisation was significant and demonstrated the economic viability of investing in renewable energy solutions for water supply infrastructure. The success of the Riu 2 solarisation project served as a testament to the potential benefits of expanding similar initiatives to other boreholes in the region.

The positive outcomes of the solar project extended beyond just cost savings. By reducing the reliance on grid electricity, the project also contributed to mitigating environmental impact. Solar energy is a clean and renewable resource, which aligns with the goals of sustainable development and environmental conservation.

Furthermore, the use of solar in boreholes enhanced the reliability and resilience of the water supply system. In areas prone to power outages or grid failures, solar–powered bore[,] holes can continue operating autonomously, ensuring uninterrupted access to clean water for the communities they serve.

As the solarisation project proved to be a resounding success, the Kikuyu Water and Sanitation Company began exploring opportunities to replicate similar initiatives across other boreholes in Kiambu County. By leveraging renewable energy technologies.

such as solar power, the company aimed to enhance the efficiency, sustainability, and affordability of water supply services for all residents.

The county is taking proactive steps to reduce electricity bills by planning to drill boreholes and later solarise them. Boreholes provide access to groundwater, offering a sustainable water source for the community. By harnessing solar energy to power these boreholes, the county can significantly cut down on electricity costs while also promoting renewable energy use. This initiative not only benefits the county financially but also contributes to environmental sustainability by reducing reliance on fossil fuels.

overnor Kimani Wamatangi has proven to be a revolutionary force in healthcare. His comprehensive and innovative approach has set new benchmarks, distinguishing his administration from the three past regimes. The system is also linked to the Central Medical Store (CMS), allowing staff to monitor stock levels and manage supplies effectively.

Service delivery has also seen remarkable improvements. Ambulance response time has been slashed to just 10 minutes. According to Chief Health Administrative Officer Pastor David Maina, the County has refurbished 13 ambulances, making them fully functional.

Other enhancements in service delivery include the implementation of advanced diagnostic equipment, expanded outpatient services, and improved patient care protocols. The county has procured assorted medical equipment worth over Ksh 500 million.

Mr. Stephen Musyoka, Director of Planning and Administration, emphasised: "Our rapid ambulance response time is just one example of how our service delivery has improved. We are committed to providing prompt and

Bursary cheques for needy students

Kiambu's Own Source Revenue grows without increase of levies

he County Government of Kiambu increased its own source revenue (OSR) for the first nine months of the 2023–2024 financial year by close to Sh1 billion to emerge among the highest revenue collectors.

The County revenue grew as a result of automation of services and sealing of loopholes. This was also realised without increasing any of the levies.

According to a 'County Budget Implementation Report Review' by Controller of Budget, Ms. Margaret Nyakang'o, covering July 2023 to March 2024, the Governor Kimani Wamatangi-led administration generated Sh3.34 billion.

Ms Nyakang'o says the ninemonth collection represents a 27.2 percent improvement compared to the same period in the last financial year, when a total of Sh2.44 billion was raised.

During the 2022–2023 financial year, Kiambu collected a total of Sh3.58 million in the whole financial year, indicating that by March 30,

2024, Mr Wamatangi was approximately Sh200 million shy of hitting his last year's collection.

"In the first nine months of FY 2023/24, the county generated a total of Kshs 3.35 billion from its sources of revenue, inclusive of the FIF (Health Facility Improvement Fund) and ordinary AIA. This amount represented an increase of 27.2 percent compared to Kshs2.44 billion realized in a similar period in FY 2022/23," Ms. Nyakang'o said in her report.

Ms Nyakango attributed the increase in OSR to the implementation of the valuation roll and the granting of waivers on land rates by the regional government, as well as the mobilisation of revenue collection at the sub-county level.

The county administration's leadership, in its bid to boost revenue, has banking on a new enterprise resource system (ERP) currently under installation, which is a holistic system that covers the management of finances in all sectors, such as hospital management, building approvals, business permits, and other revenue charges, as well as exploring more revenue streams.

The highest revenue stream ac-

cording to CoB was from hospital revenue (FIF), which raised Sh879.45 million, contributing 26.2 percent of the total OSR receipts during the reporting period, followed by the Department of Lands, which raised Sh602 million from land rates.

Technical Services contributed Sh590 million, business permits (Sh306 million), car parking (Sh266 million), and "other sources" contributed Sh704 million to the OSR basket, which counties rely on to supplement their respective annual budgets.

budgets. The county, according to CoB, has been on an upward trajectory, having collected Sh1.16 billion in the first nine months of 2017/2018 financial year, Sh1.8.3 billion in 2018/2019, and Sh1.89 million in the following year. During the 2019/2020 financial

During the 2019/2020 financial year, the collection was lowered to Sh1.69 billion in the first nine months of 2020/2021, Sh2.1 billion in 2020/2021, Sh2.44 billion in 2022/2023, and Sh3.35 billion in the nine months of the current financial year.

But Governor Wamatangi said, though the collection is the highest ever, it's still low given the county's capacity of 13 billion.

The poor collection, he said, was

due to weak systems prone to manipulation, theft by unscrupulous revenue officers and top county officials, and failure to exploit available revenue streams, which have been depriving the county of resources.

Further, the CoB report shows that in the first nine months of FY 2023–24, the county had already spent Sh1.85 billion on development programs, representing an increase of 130 percent compared to a similar period of FY 2022–23, when the county spent Sh807.14 million.

Analysis of expenditure by departments shows that the Department of Agriculture, Livestock, and Cooperatives recorded the highest absorption rate of the development budget at 38.4 percent, followed by the Department of Education, Gender, Culture, and Social Services at 31.4 percent.

County hands over new market sites to contractors

s the County strives to provide a conducive environment for traders to conduct their businesses, more sites for market construction have been handed over to contractors. The Department of Trade, Industrialisation, Tourism, and Investments has assigned sites in Kinoo, Dagoretti, Lussigeti, Kimende and Kagwe markets to contractors.

Construction has already begun in these markets as Governor Kimani Wamatangi fulfills his pledge to build decent facilities for traders. These modern markets, fully funded by the county government, are being built using the G Plus One Construction Design and include amenities such as a cold storage room, modern washrooms, an ICT hub for youth, a crèche day-care, a social hall and a ramp for easy access for Persons Living with Disabilities.

The markets will not only enhance trading activities for small and medium-sized businesses but also boost the local economy by attracting more investments and creating employment opportunities. The county administration, through the Office of the Governor's Economic Advisor, has also established a pilot project, the Githurai 45 Kimwi Project, to evaluate various strategies developed to support bodaboda members, which will be extended to them through their registered saccos.

In addition, the Trade Directorate continues to construct bodaboda sheds, targeting 180 sheds across the county, with each ward having at least three in the first phase. So far, 57 sheds have been constructed.

"The bodaboda sector is a significant employer of youth in this county; hence, we aim to improve the riders' working conditions.

These sheds will serve as central hubs for picking up

The park's strategic location makes it easily accessible for farmers to bring their produce, positioning Kiambu as a preferred destination for investment.

"These projects indicate our commitment to enhancing the livelihoods of our people, improving local market infrastructure, and supporting economic development in Kiambu County. We will closely monitor all these projects undertaken by the Department of Trade to ensure they are completed within the set timeframe for community development," says Chief Officer of Trade, Simon Kiberenge.

oday, we gather to celebrate an important occasion in our nation's history—Madaraka Day. On this day, 61 years ago, Kenya took its first steps towards self-governance, ending decades of brutal colonial rule that began in 1920. This day marks the dawn of a new era where Kenyans were finally able to govern themselves, shaping their own destiny and future.

As we celebrate the 61st anniversary of Madaraka Day, it is fitting to acknowledge the significant strides we have made in governance and development. Kenya has blossomed into a prosperous democracy, recognised for its adoption of a progressive constitution with a robust bill of rights.

The constitution ushered in devolution, which has seen development reach every corner of our country. This is an achievement that cannot be overstated—it has been a game changer. Here in Kiambu, we are pleased that devolution has started transforming our county through an array of projects that we have rolled out as we complete our second year in office.

I am proud to inform the people of Kiambu that after 10 years of slow growth, Kiambu is now on the right trajectory, thanks to the strategies and interventions we have put in place. Since we took over the reins of this county, we embarked on the journey of "Making Kiambu Great Again," and I am proud that our vision remains firmly on course.

In line with this year's Madaraka Day theme, of "Agriculture and Food Security," my administration has prioritised agriculture and food security by coming up with ingenious ways of empowering our farmers, who form the core of our population. My administration has been distributing vital farm inputs, including maize seeds, fertilizer and avocado seedlings.

We have distributed improved Kienyeji chicks to over 40,000 women across the County to economically empower them, the pillars of our homes lift the family incomes as well as enhance the school egg feeding programme. In the next financial year, we plan to distribute piglets and heifers to boost farming in Kiambu.

To support our farmers, the contract to supply milk to our ECDEs was awarded to Githunguri Dairy creating market for our dairy farmers and ensuring resources benefit local farmers. The Department of Agriculture, Livestock and Veterinary Services offers subsidised conventional artificial insemination services in all the 12 sub counties. The department offers subsidised sexed semen through a partnership with dairy Cooperatives where the county meets 50 percent of the buying cost while dairy farmers contribute the other 50 percent through their dairy cooperatives.

The Directorate of Veterinary Services continuously undertakes animal diseases surveillance and offers mass vaccinations on need basis against diseases such as, Lumpy Skin, Foot and Mouth and Rabies. On public health, the directorate undertakes mandatory ante-and postmortem meat inspection in all the 59 slaughter houses and slaughter slabs within the county.

In aquaculture, my government has helped fish farmers construct fish ponds and provided resources like fingerlings, pond liners and nets. My administration support value addition by dairy cooperatives through supply of modern dairy equipment including coolers, pasteurisers, milk ATMs and digital weighing scales.

To revitalise coffee farming, we

For instance, we assisted the 16,000-member Komothai Coffee Farmers' Cooperative revive their mili. We are also in the process of sinking a borehole, constructing a perimeter wall and building a cupping laboratory. We are committed to revitalising the cooperatives sector. In the coming financial year, we plan to support sunflower and cassava growing in our semi-arid areas.

Affordable Healthcare is one of the key areas that my administration has prioritised. Late last year, Kiambu led in implementing the Universal Healthcare programme, ensuring medical access for our people through the "Kiambu Afya" popularly known as "Wamatangi Care'. This was in support of His Excellency President Dr. William Ruto's vision of accessible healthcare, a crucial part of the Bottom-up Transformation Agenda (BETA).

Partnering with the National Hospital Insurance Fund (NHIF), we enrolled 100,000 households, benefitting over 500,000 individuals. The medical cover has enhanced benefits, covering chronic diseases like hypertension and diabetes. Also included is a Last Expense Cover, offering Kshs.100,000 to the family of a deceased beneficiary to assist with funeral expenses. Just last week, Mr. Kamau Kimani of Kangoya village in Ndumberi Ward expressed his gratitude to the County Government after the 'Wamatangi Care' programme paid all his medical bills incurred at a hospital in Ngong, Kajiado County. Kamau's story is mirrored across the county, where the scheme is assisting residents in obtaining medical care.

Our health facilities are wellstocked with medicines and others supplies, and we are focused on controlled procurement to reduce costs and ensure continuous supply. The Central Medical Store in Ruiru, which is now complete, will streamline drug distribution for continuous facility stocking. Regarding medical infrastructure, my administration has embarked on upgrading health facilities across the County.

The construction of 13 new level 3 hospitals and upgrading 4 more to level 3 status will add our capacity by nearly 1500 beds.

We are constructing new two (2) Level 4 hospitals in Gachororo and Karuri at a cost of Ksh.500 million. The stalled hospital projects in Tigoni, Bibirioni, Wangige, Lari and Thogoto, which we inherited from the previous administrations, are now nearing completion. Upon construction of all these hospitalities our bed capacity will increase from 2,700 to 4,200.

The County Government prioritizes urban development as a crucial mandate, recognizing the need for meticulous planning amid rapid population growth. Six new municipalities — Githunguri, Lari, Gatundu, Juja, Kabete, and Githurai—have been established, securing substantial annual grants of between >>continued on page 14

Sh.400 million and Sh.500 million from entities like the World Bank. This funding is earmarked for vital infrastructure projects, including road tarmacking, water connectivity, sewerage systems, street lighting, and modern markets. Kiambu County is set to receive a significant portion of the Ksh.7.8 billion funding from the World Bank's Kenya Urban Support Program (KUSP).

Out of this, Ksh.1.6 billion will go to municipalities such as Kiambu, Karuri, Thika, Limuru, Kikuyu, Ruiru, and Juja. Notably, only Juja was considered in the newly conferred municipalities, due to its population density as compared to the other five (5) municipalities. Municipal Boards and Managers for these municipalities have already been appointed.

The County is in the process of digitizing the land registry, automating building plans approval processes, and implementing an informal settlement upgrading program through the Kenya Informal Settlements Improvement Project (KISIP).

Title deeds will soon be issued to inhabitants of areas like Kiandutu in Thika, Matharau, Kanjeru, and Karanjee.

We have conducted land clinics in various wards in order to enhance service delivery to promote public adherence to guidelines on property development, land rates payment, and compliance with County requirements. My administration's vision extends beyond infrastructure improvements to industrialization, with a focus on transforming Thika into an Industrial Smart City. Already, the county has set aside land for the entablement of an Economic Processing Zone and provision of affordable housing. The Smart City will lead an increase in industries, improved transport infrastructure, as well as the development of a competitive edge in advanced technology. We aim to collaborate with the national government and the private sector, to actualize this dream that will lead to the creation of over 50,000 jobs and drive economic growth in Kiambu.

To catalyse socio-economic transformation, my administration prioritises revamping the County's road network, a key aspect of my Manifesto. Our aim is to ensure well-maintained and accessible roads across all 60 wards.

To improve mobility and accessibility Countywide, my government has embarked on a robust road construction, rehabilitation and improvement program targeting over 1,000 kilometres of access road. This program focuses on use of County Road maintenance units (i.e. graders, compactor rollers, excavators, water bowser's, shovels and backhoes) distributed across all the 12 Sub-Counties covering the 60 wards. We have acquired a new fleet comprising of five (5) dumping trucks, one (1) prime mover plus low loader, one (1) water bowser to boost in-house capacity.

We will build five (5) new bridges (Kahawa Wendani, Gwa Gatimu, Theta-Gatongora, Miumia, and Maiguiti) to improve connectivity. In addition, we will complete all earlier initiated motorable bridges and ongoing road works. Further, we plan to procure stone crusher and asphalt concrete plant to

boost our capacity for continuous improvement of road construction and related infrastructural development programmes.

However, it is worth noting that, we experienced heavy rainfall that led to damage of access roads and storm water drainage system due to blockage by encroachment of water ways and riparian lands by unscrupulous developers, haphazard solid waste disposal leading to immense flooding. We are committed to improving accessibility through revamping road network and associated infrastructure.

I urge all Kiambu residents to observe sobriety in avoiding blockage of waterways.

In our commitment to securing a brighter future for our children, our "Leave No Child Behind" initiative has sparked a transformative shift in education across Kiambu.

To eliminate barriers, we have enhanced bursary allocation from Kshs.100 million to Kshs.500 million thereby removing financial obstacles that hindered countless needy children from accessing education.

In 2023, we gave bursaries worth Kshs.300 million to around 78,000 beneficiaries. This year we are going to disburse bursaries worth Kshs.500 million. Already we have disbursed Kshs.400 million, and the cheques are being distributed to the beneficiaries. This enhanced bursary allocation will assist more needy students as well as increase the amount received by each beneficiary. The amount allocated to each beneficiary has increased to Ksh.5,000 and above and the very vulnerable are awarded full scholarships.

Upon assuming office, I made a firm commitment to transform the state of Early Childhood Education Centres (ECDEs) in Kiambu. Towards this end, 134 ECDE centres are in various stages of completion and will be opened for use later this month. The next phase involves the construction of 120 ECDE centres, with construc-

My government has committed towards elevation of the nutritional standards of the Kiambu ECDE learners by investing in a robust feeding program. ECDE children receive a bowl of fortified uji daily, three boiled eggs weekly and a packet pasteurised milk to boost healthy development. These initiatives have seen enrolment at our ECDEs rising from 32,000 in 2023 to 38,032 in May 2024. For example: In Renguti ECDE in Nachu, enrolment has risen by 93, Lower Kihara ECDE by 81 just to mention a few cases.

To enhance co-curricular activities among Kiambu ECDE learners, my government has installed a play station consisting of 6-seater merrygo-round, single slide, 3-seater swing and constructed a sandpit in the new ECDE centres.

Turning to the water sector, under the "Maji Nyumbani" initiative, the Department of Water, Environment, Energy and Natural Resources has already procured and supplied over 200 kilometres pipe network to the eight county water companies. As we progressively supply water to Kiambu residents through our water companies, we have managed to connect over 15,000 households.

In a bid to increase water sources within the county so as to be able to meet the increasing water demand, my administration has embarked on a programme to drill and equip 17 new boreholes as well as operationalise 10 existing boreholes. Some of the boreholes include Gatuanabu, Nderu, Mariani, Njiku, Lari DCC just to mention but a few. We are also ensuring that existing borehole projects such as Riu Nderi, Gatina, Mitahato amongst others are functional and fully utilised. Projects such as Gitogothi borehole project and Gathanje Village Borehole are already complete. Our water companies have managed : to install nearly 100 kilometres of the pipes supplied, and are in the process of laying all other pipes in the target areas. We have supplied fifty-six 10,000 litre plastic tanks in various public institutions including ECDEs : and hospitals across the county in a bid to enhance rainwater harvesting. We have also rehabilitated 15 existing public toilets; constructed 11 new VIP toilets in cemeteries and constructed three modern toilets in public spaces.

On Tourism, my government is in partnership with the Ministry of Tourism to rehabilitate and repackage tourism products in the County starting with 14 falls, Mathore view point and Kinale Forest (elephant maternity).

Some of the projects we have carried out in the Department of Youth and Sports include the upgrading of Thika stadium, Kagwe Stadium, Githunguri stadium, Thigio sports grounds, Kirangari sports ground and Kanjeru stadium. The scope of work entails completion of stands, construction of stalls along the perimeter wall, levelling, compacting, and planting of grass and installation of Astroturf. We have also exposed our youth in various programmes to support their innovation and creativity. The County partnered with various agencies like Kenya Film Commission, Safaricom, Meta, among others to train the youth on different skills that would assist them become more productive.

In bringing services closer to the people, we have ensured that all our sub county offices are in good shape through renovations and completing the stalled ones.

All these achievements are the result of the prudent and economic use of public resources, which has remained the cornerstone of my administration. As part of the financial reforms, I am happy to note that the new digital system is now operational. This system has sealed all leakages in revenue streams.

On the ballooning wage bill, I wish to confirm that we have already engaged a consultant to carry out a comprehensive forensic audit of the payroll management system and human resource. This will help us clean up our payroll and avoid paying ghost workers, hence managing our wage bill.

As I conclude, I appeal to all leaders in our great County to embrace unity of purpose. Let us stop these unnecessary wrangles that are likely to be detrimental to our County. The people are looking up to us to deliver on the promises we made to them. We should not let them down.
