Wamatangi, who took office in August 2022, highlighted his main achievements in health, education, agriculture, water, transport infrastructure, and the enhancement of the county's own source revenue collection.

From the construction and equipping of 109 new model ECDE centers and feeding programs, the increase of the bursary kitty, a universal health care plan covering 100,000 households, the start of 20 new level four and level three hospitals, and new hospital equipment

to the distribution of farm inputs to over 500,000 farmers, the governor believed he is well on course with the implementation of his campaign manifesto.

Further, the administration has rehabilitated over 1,000 kilometers of access roads, started construction of a county aggregation and industrial park in Githunguri, drilled new boreholes, supplied nearly 228 kilometers of assorted pipes and fittings to extend water services across the county, and constructed six new bus packs and markets.

"After establishing a firm founda-

tion in the first year, we are now cruising, and we hope that by the end of the third year, Kiambu will be a county like no other in terms of development. As I promised, during my swearing-in ceremony at the historic Kirigiti Stadium after the election, I vowed to "Make Kiambu Great Again," and I am proud to see that the work we started immediately has begun to bear fruit," the governor said.

This, he said, was made possible by his prudent financial management, which included reducing waste and theft and raising local revenue from Sh3

billion to roughly Sh4.6 billion so that development could be funded.

"When you heard the onslaughts against me, it was because I made an unpopular decision with some leaders. No dubious tenders to steal county money. Kiambu officials no longer travel for benchmarking because we elected a tent at the county offices where all meetings are done. Tenders are competitive to ensure they get the best costs. That is how we managed to mobilize money for the not only visible but impactful developments," he said.

He said the county completed 109

new ECDE centers, which were officially opened in October this year.

They are fully fledged, entire centers, not just classrooms.

Each center includes PP1 and PP2 classrooms with tiles and ceilings, an office, an ablution block for teachers and children, and a well-equipped play area with swings, tunnels, and a sand-pit.

The county is already constructing 130 more ECDE centers to be completed by January next year, and according to the governor, all 524 nursery schools in the county will have new, modern ECDEs

Beyond infrastructure, the county has implemented a comprehensive feeding program to keep children in school and enhance their nutritional standards.
Every morning, children receive a nutritious bowl of uji, along with eggs three days a week and a packet of milk on Thursday of every week.
"This initiative has significantly boosted enrollment and attendance, with the number of learners increasing from 32,000 to over 39,000," he said.
The devolved administration has

also significantly increased bursary allocation to Sh500 million, benefiting over 100,000 students across all 60 wards. Each student receives between Sh5,000 and Sh10,000.
In the health sector, the county is implementing Wamatangi Care, a comprehensive free medical cover that caters to outpatient, inpatient, and chronic ailments such as diabetes, cancer, and high blood pressure. In case of death, the bereaved family gets Sh100,000 as the last expense cover.
"My government has renovated various health facilities and initiated

the construction of 16 new Level 3 hospitals. Meanwhile, the stalled Level 4 hospitals in Lari, Thogoto, Githunguri, Bibirioni, Wangige, and Tigoni are nearing completion. Additionally, new Level 4 hospitals are being constructed in Juja and Karuri," he said.
The hospitals feature outpatient and inpatient wings with 16-bed maternity wards, 10-bed general wards, 6-bed pediatric wards, laboratories, and theaters.
The facilities already underway are Kiganjo in Kemenu, Thika, Kahawa Sukari, Ndeiya in Limuru, Uthiru, Gathiga in

Nyathuna, Kabete, Ndenderu, Kiawaroga in Limuru East, Ndumburi, Gichuru in Sigona, and Kikuyu.
The other sites set for construction are Athena in Thika, Witeithie, and Cinda, where the tenders have already been advertised, while in Ndarasha in Theta, Kiamumbi, and Mwioko, land issues are being addressed.
Assorted medical equipment, including X-ray machines, ultrasound machines, suction machines, dental X-ray machines, and pulse oximeters, has been delivered to hospitals across the county.

In the agriculture sector, farmers have received over 250,000 free improved kienyeji chicks, and over 450,000 farmers have been given free certified maize seeds and fertilizer as well as piglets to the youth as part of the county's social economic empowerment programme.
"We regularly monitor our progress to ensure that no department is left behind in serving the people of Kiambu. I am glad we are receiving positive feedback from residents who are witnessing the change we continue to bring about," he said.

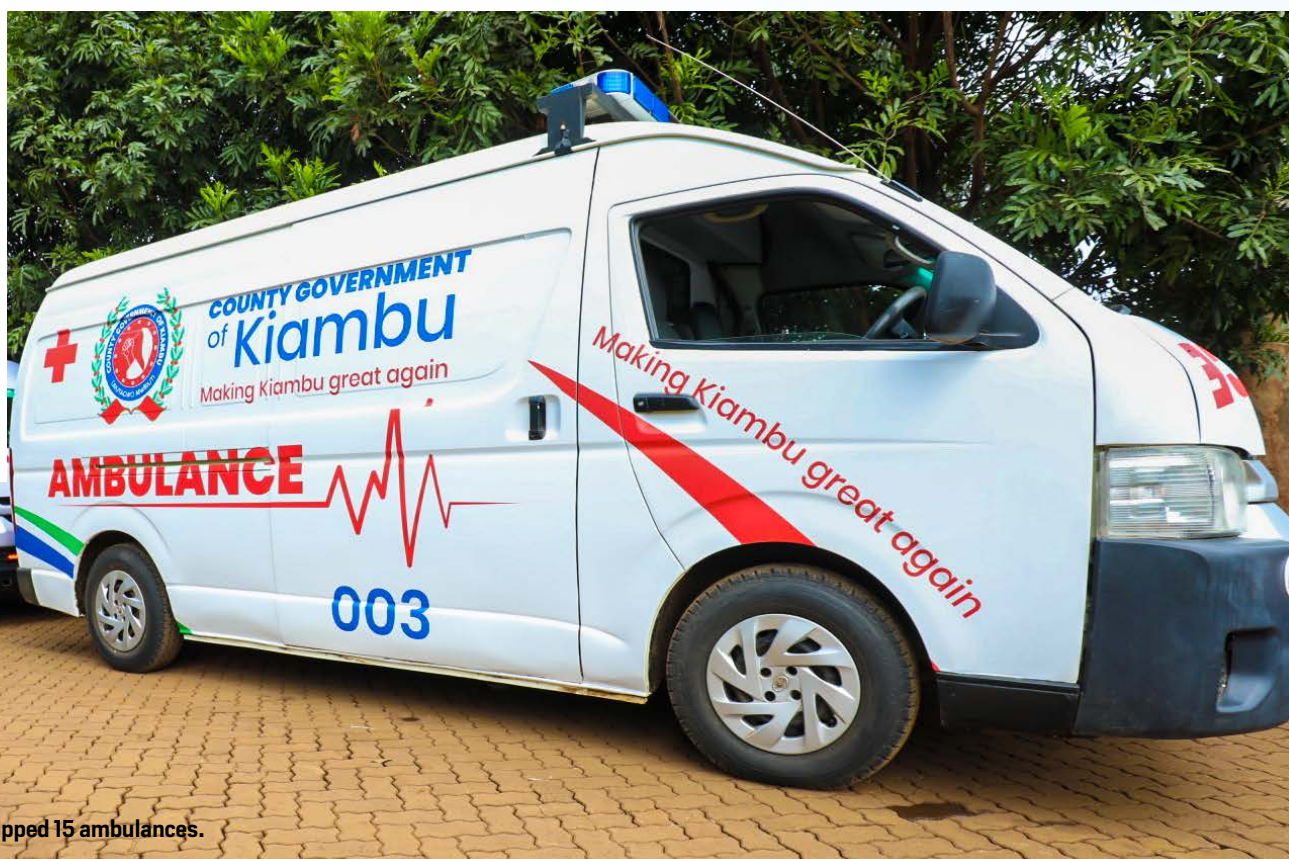

Wamatangi has steadied the ship in the health sector

Kiambu County has seen significant improvements in healthcare over the past two years under Governor Kimani Wamatangi's leadership. Through new programs and the revival of stalled projects, his administration has worked hard to improve health services for residents.

In October 2023, Governor Wamatangi launched the Universal Healthcare (UHC) programme Kiambu Afya, which is locally known as 'Wamatangi Care.' This program has been impactful, enrolling over 100,000 households. It provides essential services like outpatient and inpatient care, chronic disease management and funeral expense coverage, giving families Ksh 100,000 for bereavement.

When Governor Wamatangi took office, he inherited six stalled Level 4 hospital projects: Bibirioni, Lari, Tigoni, Thogoto, Wangige and Githunguri. Some, like the Thogoto Level 4 Hospital, had been incomplete since 2015.

Thanks to his leadership, construction on these hospitals is now progressing steadily, bringing residents closer to modern health facilities.

The County Executive Committee Member Department of Health Services Dr Elias Maina said that the health sector in Kiambu has been one of the most improved since Governor Wamatangi took over.

"The unfinished facilities represented missed opportunities for healthcare services in underserved areas but the Governor is determined to complete them. Reviving these projects became a priority, and we have made progress to bring each facility to completion," says Dr. Maina.

To meet the World Health Organisation's recommendation that no one should walk more than five kilometres for healthcare, the Governor prioritised building 16 new Level 3 hospitals across the county. These will include inpatient and outpatient services,

maternity wards with theatres, laboratories and administrative blocks. Some of these facilities are nearing completion, ensuring that every ward has a modern healthcare centre.

The county has also started building new Level 4 hospitals in Karuri and Juja, each costing Ksh 210 million. These facilities will further boost healthcare access for thousands of residents.

Governor Wamatangi's administration has invested over Ksh 500 million in medical equipment, including ultrasound machines and X-rays. This has equipped health facilities that previously lacked basic diagnostic tools, improving the quality of care available.

Existing healthcare centres have also undergone extensive renovations. Many facilities, some of which had not been painted since they were built, now offer cleaner and more comfortable environments for patients and staff.

The Governor has also focused on healthcare workers' welfare. Over 700 workers have been promoted and 2,000 new staff members are being recruited to strengthen the healthcare workforce. Additionally, 3,070 Community Health Promoters have been engaged and are now receiving a monthly stipend. Kiambu was the first county to recognise and reward their critical role in community health.

"The progress we are witnessing in Kiambu is both unprecedented and comprehensive. From the modernisation of medical infrastructure to an emphasis on staffing and equipment, our healthcare system has been reshaped to meet the evolving needs of our people," says Dr. Patrick Nyaga, Chief Officer Health Services.

Governor Wamatangi's efforts have improved access to quality healthcare and created a healthier Kiambu. His continued focus on healthcare is delivering lasting benefits for the people of the county.

The county government of Kiambu has officially opened the 109 newly constructed Early Childhood Development Education centers in the county, even as he announced that another 130 centers were already underway.

Governor Kimani Wamatangi said the symbolic launch that happened last month at the Githi ECDE Centre in Githiga Ward, Githunguri Sub-County, marks a new beginning for a sector that has previously suf-

fered from neglect and lack of support.

Each center, which rivals private academies, features two modern classrooms—PP1 and PP2—an office for administrative use, separate ablution blocks for both teachers and learners and a well-equipped play area for children.

“Research consistently underscores the importance of early childhood education, revealing that a positive first impression of school significantly influences a child’s lifelong attitude toward learning. Recognizing this, we have prioritized the moderniza-

tion of ECDE centers immediately after his election, aiming to ensure that the youngest learners begin their educational journey in an environment that is both nurturing and stimulating,” the Governor said.

He added: “We are constructing new model ECDE centers and renovating existing ones to provide modern facilities akin to those found in private kindergartens.”

Wamatangi said the second phase of the project was already underway, with 130 ECDE centres under construction, and are expected to be ready by Decem-

ber.

Governor Wamatangi’s commitment extends beyond brick-and-mortar improvements. He has also implemented a comprehensive feeding program to keep children in school and enhance their learning experience.

Every morning, the children receive a bowl of nutritious uji, complemented by eggs three days a week and a packet of milk. This initiative has significantly boosted attendance, with the number of learners increasing from 32,000 to over 39,000.

County ECDE feeding program boosts pupils' population by 7,000

The Kiambu County Government has been implementing a feeding program in all public Early Childhood Development Education (ECDE) centres, dramatically increasing enrolment.

According to Governor Kimani Wamatangi, the comprehensive feeding program, which aims to

keep children in school and improve their nutritional standards, has increased the number of learners from 32,000 to 39,000.

As part of the program, children receive a nutritious bowl of fortified porridge every morning, along with eggs three days a week and a packet of milk every Thursday.

"ECDE plays a critical role in laying a strong foundation for future academic success. Research shows that

the experiences and skills gained during these early years form the bedrock of a child's cognitive, emotional, and social development. That is why we are supporting this sector," says Wamatangi.

The Governor has emphasised that the feeding program is free for all children attending Kiambu ECDE centers.

In support of local women entrepreneurs, the Governor has highlight-

ed that the county government has supplied improved Kienyeji chicks to enable women to become suppliers of eggs to the ECDE centres.

"We have provided women with improved Kienyeji chicks, empowering them to raise chickens and supply eggs to our ECDEs. Some women are already benefiting from this initiative," he says.

To strengthen the feeding program further, the Governor has an-

nounced plans to begin constructing kitchen facilities in January 2025.

"By the 2025/2026 financial year, we plan to have kitchens built across all wards, creating world-class ECDE centres that cater to our young learners' needs," says Wamatangi.

This feeding program complements Governor Wamatangi's administration's infrastructural investments in the ECDE sector.

In the past two years, efforts to improve transportation and boost the economy have led to the modernisation of seven bus parks in six sub-counties. An additional five bus parks are planned for construction, including OJ in Ruiru, Kimende in Lari, Kiganjo in Gatundu South and Dagoretti in Kikuyu, while Thika's main bus park is being redesigned.

Five motorable bridges are being built, including the Mariguiti bridge connecting Gituamba ward, Mwimia bridge in Githiga ward (Githunguri), Kahawa Wendani bridge at Kiuu river in Ruiru, Canaan bridge linking Theta to Gatong'ora ward, and Gwa Gatimu bridge in Ndarugu ward.

Additionally, five foot-bridges have been completed in parts of Gatundu North, Gatundu South, and Githunguri,

making it easier to transport goods like tea, milk, and other produce. These include bridges like Lioki Giathieko linking Ngewa and Ikinu wards, Kian-da Kinene in Gitwe Ndarugo, Githima-Muguti, and Kianwe footbridge at Gatamaiyu River in Komothai ward.

Over 1,000 kilometres of rural access roads have been improved through grading, gravelling, and drainage works. This has been achieved through 17 County road maintenance units across 60 wards. These units use machinery like graders, tippers, rollers, and water bowsers. The gravel used for the roads is sourced locally to save costs and promote local businesses, providing jobs for casual workers. Chief Officer for Roads, Edmund Njihia, says the materials are tested for quality to ensure road durability.

To improve accessibility and security, 570 streetlights

Roads, public transport among key priorities by Wamatangi's administration

have been installed in five informal settlements in Kiambu. This includes 105 lights in Misri, Limuru, 142 in Fort Jesus Gitambaya in Ruiru, 114 in

Bosnia, Githurai, 76 in Umoja, Thika, and 163 in Kiangombe. An additional 6,000 solar streetlights are being procured for installation in the 60

wards. This is part of Governor Wamatangi's Angaza Kiambu program, aiming to meet power needs using clean, renewable energy.

Kiambu County, under Governor Kimani Wamatangi, has also developed a County Road Safety Action Plan (2024-2028) in line with the National Road Safety Action Plan. This has led to the creation of Sub-County Transport and Safety Committees to manage road safety and oversee transportation systems. According to the NTSA, 10.6 percent of road accident fatalities in Kenya happen in Kiambu, making it one of the eight high-risk counties. The goal of the four-year plan is to reduce road deaths and injuries by 50percent through enforcement, education, vehicle safety checks, and improved road infrastructure.

This plan also aims to strengthen partnerships between national and county governments, as well as the private sector, for better road transport management.

Agriculture flourishes two years on

In the two years since Governor Kimani Wamatangi took office, his administration has focused on building a strong and empowered community. Distribution of 398,000 Tonnes of Maize: To fight food insecurity, Governor Wamatangi's administration started a large-scale maize seed distribution program in December 2022. So far, the administration has distributed 398,000 tonnes of maize seed to farmers.

This project helps farmers grow more food, even with the challenges of unpredictable weather and changing market prices. By using good-quality maize seeds and better farming techniques, Kiambu farmers are now able to produce more, ensuring a steady supply of food for the county. It has also boosted related businesses like feed production, veterinary services, and marketing. Moreover, the increased poultry production provides families with a steady source of protein, improving overall nutrition in the county.

Distribution of Fruit Seedlings: Governor Wamatangi also recognised the potential of fruit farming to enhance food security and create new income opportunities. As part of this, 96,000 fruit seedlings—pawpaw, mango, and orange—were distributed to farmers across the county. Fruit farming is less water-intensive and offers better financial returns compared to traditional

crops. This project helps farmers tap into local and regional markets, while also supporting environmental conservation by improving soil fertility and reducing erosion.

A Holistic Approach to Agricultural Empowerment: Governor Wamatangi's agricultural programs are part of a bigger plan to support sustainable development. His administration works closely with experts, farmers and development partners to ensure these efforts are long-lasting. Farmers receive training on modern farming methods, pest control and post-harvest management. The county also provides subsidised inputs like fertilizers to improve productivity. In addition, the administration is creating market linkages to help farmers sell their produce locally and internationally and is investing in storage and pro-

cessing facilities to reduce waste and improve profits.

County distributes piglets to men as part its social economic empowerment

The County Government of Kiambu has launched the distribution of two month-old piglets to men's groups in the county as part of his administration's social-economic empowerment initiatives through agribusiness.

Governor Kimani Wamatangi distributed the first batch of the piglets, which was part of his campaign manifesto, in Mangu-Ward in Gatundu North Sub County, marking the programme's official launch that will be extended across the county.

Each of the identified groups is benefiting from up to 10 piglets and feed as seed capital, with Wamatangi saying that, in addition to distributing the animals, his administration will assist in extension services and marketing.

"Through this project, we aim to engage both men and youth in pig rearing, which, if well nurtured, has the potential to uplift our people economically. This piglet distribution is part of our grassroots empowerment strategy, which has also seen my administration provide improved Kienyeji chicks to women across Kiambu," the governor said.

Over the past two years, the county has distributed 410,000 chickens, and this year, an additional 240,000 chickens will be provided. Beneficiaries are be-

ing prepared to supply the county ECDE feeding programme, where the 39,000 pupils get uji daily, two eggs a week, and a packet of milk every Thursday.

According to the county chief, his administration has been keen on reviving agriculture in the county. He said that besides the piglets and improved kienyeji chicks, farmers will also get free heifers and will continue getting free maize seeds, fertilizer, and fruits.

County Chief Officer in charge of Agriculture, John Ngige Kuria, said



"We have thoroughly vetted and registered the men's groups before giving them the animals. We have our extension officers embedded with them because we want the project to achieve its intended purpose, which is providing the beneficiaries with an income-generating venture," Mr Ngige said.

the department would work with the beneficiaries to raise the animals for guaranteed best farming practices and marketing.

"We have thoroughly vetted and registered the men's groups before giving them the animals. We have our extension officers embedded with them because we want the project to achieve its intended purpose, which is providing the beneficiaries with an income-generating venture," Mr Ngige said.

With each sow siring between 10 and 15 piglets per litter, Ngige said they expect the groups to own up to 100 pigs within just a few months. After that, they can sell some for profit at a cost of up to Sh30 000 each and keep others for further breeding.

Joseph Mburu, a member of one of the groups gifted with the animals, said that they had already identified a location within the Gatukuyu area where they would

keep them as a team.

He said their group includes a mixture of youth and older men, and they plan to assign themselves responsibilities in recruiting them.

"To us, this is a dream come true. We have always wanted to start an income-generating venture, but we didn't have the capital. But with ten piglets, we are sorted. We will keep them until they litter at least once before thinking about selling them," Mburu said.



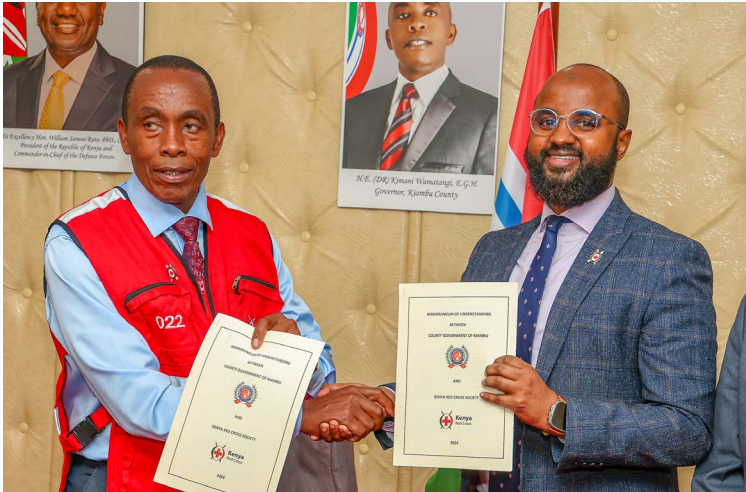

County , National Government in partnership for construction of Ksh. 550 million Githunguri Market

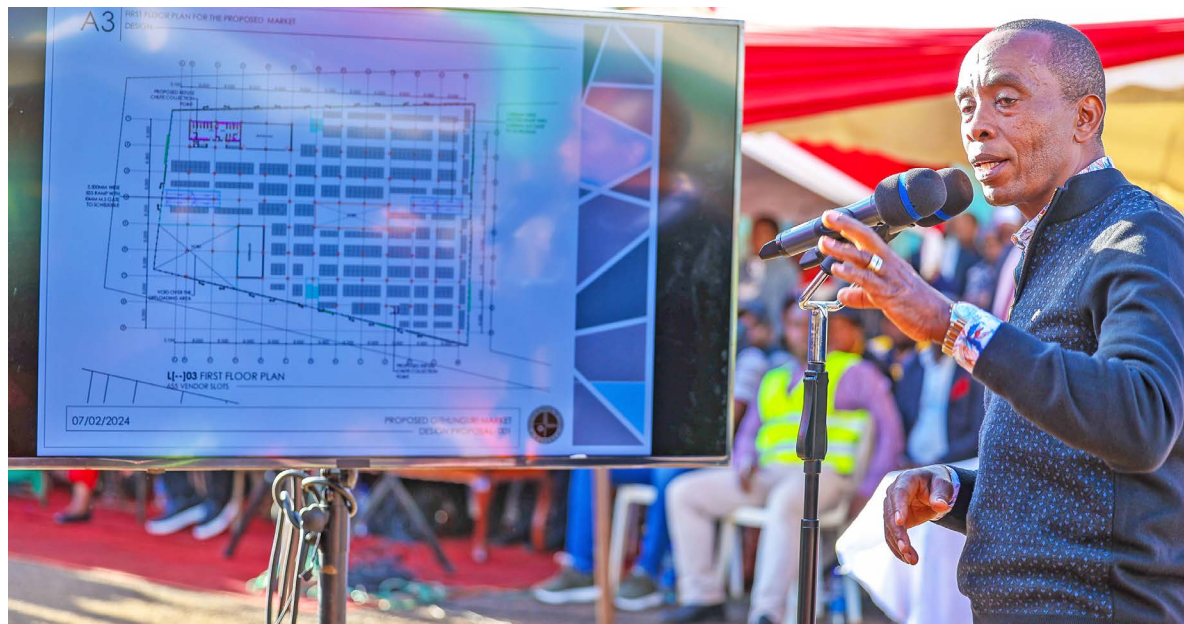
The county government of Kiambu and national government are collaborating in constructing a Ksh. 550 million, three-level modern Githunguri Market in Githunguri Town.

The national government has allocated Ksh. 400 million, while the county government is contributing Ksh. 150 million for the project, which will be implemented in two phases, with the first phase benefiting 2080 traders.

Kiambu Governor Kimani Wamatangi held a public participation forum with traders ahead of the groundbreaking of the project.

The market's design was developed by the county's public works directorate and ratified by Kenya School of TVETS, and it features a 178-capacity car parking lot in the basement. The ground floor will have 645 slots, a loading bay, and cold storage. The first floor will have 655 slots, a social hall, a creche daycare, and a dispensary, while the second floor will host an ICT hub, a restaurant, and 768 stalls.

The governor promised a smooth temporary relocation of traders to pave the way for the construction and assured them that the process of allocation of slots in the new market would be done transparently to ensure only bonafide traders would benefit.

Market development across Kiambu as Governor Wamatangi eyes more in the third year

Over the past two years, the Department of Trade, Industrialisation, Tourism and Investments in Kiambu County has achieved significant progress in improving the livelihoods of residents and boosting the county's development.

Some key projects include building and renovating markets, constructing bodaboda sheds, ensuring fair trade practices, promoting industrial and entrepreneurial activities and establishing a County Aggregation and Industrial Park.

To improve market conditions and create better trading opportunities, the Directorate of Trade and Markets completed and opened several markets, including Gitaru Market in Kabete, Rironi Market Phase II in Limuru East and Kiganjo Market in Gatundu South. Kigumo Market in Githunguri is almost finished, with 98 percent of the work completed. These modern markets, which will

benefit over 1,000 traders, attract customers from various areas.

New markets in Kinoo, Dagorreti, Theta Kimbo, Matangini and Kagwe are under construction, transforming open-air markets into modern ones. These markets will feature amenities like cold storage rooms, modern washrooms, free Wi-Fi, food courts, day-care centres, social halls and ramps for easy access for persons with disabilities.

CEC for Trade Ms Susan Gatwiri, noted that each of these five markets is funded by the county government at Ksh50 million each. They will have access roads, proper drainage, solar lighting, floodlights and waste management systems, all aimed at boosting local commerce and providing better economic opportunities.

Renovations have also been done at Wangige Market, Jamhuri Market in Thika and Limuru/Rongai Market. In collaboration with the national government, work has begun on markets such as Soko Mjinga, Ting'anga,

Ngewa, Ngecha, Gitwe and others. To prepare for the opening of these markets, the department held data verification exercises for traders and conducted market committee elections in several markets, allowing traders to manage their businesses more effectively.

The department has also constructed 125 bodaboda sheds out of a planned 180, making it easier for riders to operate in both sunny and rainy seasons. Additionally, rural access roads have been improved, helping bodaboda operators and other traders.

To promote fair trade practices, the Weights and Measures section verified and stamped 3,736 weights, 2,622 weighing instruments, and 1,437 measuring instruments, collecting Ksh4.7 million in verification fees.

In line with the Governor's promise to support entrepreneurship, the department has overseen the construction of 36 modern kiosks in

Kabete, which are nearly complete. These kiosks will help small-scale traders grow their businesses.

The Directorate of Industrialisation has initiated the construction of two carwash stations in Kamangu (Kikuyu) and Kanyariri (Kabete). It is also developing a County Aggregation and Industrial Park at Waruhui Farm in Githunguri, in partnership with the State Department of Housing and the Council of Governors.

With 64 million shillings allocated, this park will serve as a hub for agricultural processing and manufacturing, linking farmers with industries and markets. Farmers will also learn about agribusiness from experts.

Additionally, the Industrialisation team held a sensitisation forum for 20 contractors under a youth empowerment program by USAID, where over 500 youths were trained in business skills.

Efforts are also underway to settle Juakali artisans in designated

lands, with settlements completed in Juja and near completion in Gargantuan.

In tourism, Kiambu is focused on mapping, developing, and promoting its tourist sites while addressing challenges that hinder the sector. The county plans to improve cultural centres, rehabilitate tourist sites, and develop eco-tourism destinations.

The Directorate of Investment, along with the Directorate of Industrialization, participated in the Kenya International Investment Conference (KIICO), where they showcased products made by Kiambu MSMEs and highlighted investment opportunities.

Lastly, the department has developed a Kiambu County Trade, Industrialisation, Tourism and Investments policy, which is currently awaiting approval. This policy aims to protect traders' rights and address issues affecting them.

Ksh. 500 million County Aggregation and Industrial Park (CAIP)

The County Government of Kiambu, in collaboration with the national government, has started the construction of a Ksh. 500 million County Aggregation and Industrial Park (CAIP) within Waruhiu Farm in Githunguri.

According to Governor Kimani Wamatangi, the facility, which is on a 10-acre parcel of land, is anticipated to support the value addition and marketing of fruits and horticulture, which are largely produced in Githunguri, Gatundu North and Gatundu South, Kiambu, Kiambaa, Limuru, and Lari sub-counties.

Wamatangi, while officially launched the facility's construction, said his administration has already factored Sh250 million into its 2024-2025 budget, while the national government will contribute the other Sh250 million.

"The aggregation and industrial park will serve as a hub for agricultural processing and manufacturing, creating a vital link between farmers, indus-

tries and markets. The part will focus on the processing and marketing avocado and banana fruits and vegetables and any other horticultural produce in the county," Wamatangi said.

Wamatangi said a feasibility study favouring the grounds' central location, viability, and sustainability guided his decision to locate the project at Waruhiu Agriculture Training Center in Githunguri Sub-County.

The County Aggregation and Industrial Parks will house an aggregation centre with sections for collection, sorting, grading, cleaning, packaging, and cold storage, as well as value addition, processing equipment, and common user facilities.

Further, the CAIP will be linked to an online warehouse management system to promote market access. Its main objective is to grow manufacturing and agro-industrial investments and enhance the competitiveness of the agriculture sector.

"Most people in Kiambu depend on agriculture, mainly producing fruits and horticulture due to the shrinking of land. Regretfully, they never benefit be-

cause intermediaries buy the raw produce cheaply. You will find an avocado fruit bought at Sh5 and sold at 30 shillings in a nearby shopping centre. However, value-adding to their produce and linking them to reliable markets will guarantee the primary producers the highest possible returns," the county chief added.

Kiambu County government has been distributing free avocado seedlings and other farm inputs to local farmers as part of its social and economic empowerment initiatives.

The county chief has stated that this is necessary because the county's farming land base is rapidly being reduced to make way for real estate development, and the people need to find an alternate source of income through agriculture.

The national government, through the Ministry of Trade and Investment, in collaboration with County Governments, has been rolling out County Aggregates and Industrial Parks in forty-seven (47) Counties to promote the value chain approach.

The joint investment intends to

boost agriculture to create inclusive decent jobs, promote productivity at the firm level, increase farmers' income, export, foreign exchange, and grow the economy.

Further, the governor announced that his administration has allocated funds to rehabilitate and expand the infrastructure and install the necessary facilities at the Waruhiu Agriculture Training Center.

Besides infrastructure, which includes fast-tracking the completion of a stalled dam for a steady water supply in the facility that has been grappling with broken equipment and has been reluctant to embrace technology, the governor said the county was pursuing a partnership with Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology to modernize and turn it into an agricultural centre of excellence in the Mt Kenya region.

With the partnership, Wamatangi said the county government seeks to tap the university's capacity for excellence in agriculture research and advanced technology to introduce farmers to modern farming.

The journey to make water accessible to all well on course

The Department of Water, Environment, Natural Resources, Energy and Climate Change has made great progress for the past two years.

Their focus has been on improving water access, environmental care and building infrastructure to help local communities.

The County Executive Committee Member (CECM) David Kuria has spoken about the positive changes the department has realised.

"We have made important steps to ensure that every person in Kiambu has access to clean water and better sanitation. Our goal is to make sure no one is left behind as we work towards managing water sustainably," he says.

One of the major achievements is the drilling of six new boreholes in areas like Komothai Coffee Growers, Gatuanabu, Lari DCC, Ondiri, Gathanji and Njiku. These boreholes will serve areas with large populations, and the department plans to power them with solar energy in the next financial year. The

boreholes are currently awaiting solar installations, with ongoing efforts to install water pipelines across different parts of the county.

Jennifer Musyoki, the Chief Officer for this department, highlighted the focus on sustainability, explaining that by using solar energy for the boreholes, the county is reducing costs and helping to protect the environment.

The department has also delivered 228 kilometres of water pipes to extend water services throughout the county. They are working on improving drainage systems and upgrading public sanitation facilities.

In the sanitation sector, they have repaired and improved public toilets in places like Wangige Food Market, Kahawa Sukari, Mundoro, Nyathuna, Gathiga, Mboboine, Bibirioni, Muguga and Kiambu Bus Park. New toilets have also been built in cemeteries and playgrounds to ensure that essential services are available to everyone.

To tackle waste management, the Directorate of Environment and Waste Management has been organising monthly clean-ups, making waste bins, and improving

infrastructure. The addition of a weighbridge and other improvements at the Kang'oki landfill has made waste operations more efficient.

Kiambu County is also taking care of its natural resources by setting up new tree nurseries, public parks, and mapping riparian areas. They have been training staff and raising awareness on sustainable practices.

The Directorate of Energy and Climate Change has been busy too. They are working on a County Energy Plan, assessing climate risks, and collaborating with the Adaptation

Consortium on climate finance and legislation. This is important for making the county more resilient to future environmental challenges.

A key milestone is the allocation of Ksh99 million through the Financially Locally Led Climate Action (FLLoCA) Program for projects across all 60 wards. This funding will help address climate change, with communities helping decide which projects are most needed.

Looking ahead, the department's 2024/2025 budget includes more water projects, like the solarisation of the Gititu borehole, and pipeline installations in Muguga and Nyanduma. They also plan to drill more boreholes in areas such as Juja farm, Kabete, Rweni, and Githunguri, among others, through the FLLoCA program.

The department will continue to prioritize natural resource management and environmental protection. Projects include river and wetland assessments, setting up more parks and tree nurseries, and distributing Hass avocado seedlings.

Infrastructure improvements are also planned, such as building a gate and fence at the Kang'oki office site, expanding the landfill, and setting up a Material Recovery Facility. The department will invest in more waste management tools like skip platforms, a compactor, and road maintenance to improve their services.

Kiambu County Government's bold steps to safeguard public land

The County Government of Kiambu, through the Directorate of Physical Planning, has started the process to create Part Development Plans (PDPs) for public lands in the county.

Part Development Plans are short-term plans indicating precise sites for immediate implementation of specific projects including land alienation for public use.

This critical legal process is mandated by the Physical and Land Use Planning Act (PLUPA) 2019 focusing on protecting public lands from encroachment and unauthorized changes in use.

These plans are important tools in urban planning. They focus on smaller areas within towns or cities and help plan land use for housing, businesses, public facilities, and roads. They ensure land is used properly and growth happens in an organized way, following the larger

development plans of the region.

Ms. Hannah Maranga, the Director of Physical Planning, is leading this effort. Her team has already surveyed over 40 parcels of public land across Kiambu County in the current financial year. These pieces of land are set aside for public amenities, including sites like the proposed Kiliview Primary School in Thika, the Kikuyu Township Primary School, Karweti Water Trust in Githunguri, Kabete High School in Lower Kabete, and the Kiambu County Assembly site, among others.

Ms. Maranga said, "By creating PDPs, we are not only protecting public lands but also making sure they are used in ways that benefit the community. These plans will help guide sustainable growth while ensuring public land is used properly for future generations."

She added, "Apart from PDP preparation the directorate has been working very closely with the National Land Commission (NLC) to ensure

that public land surrendered through subdivision is registered under the Government unlike before where it used to be transferred to private entities without the knowledge of county government. This is as per PLUPA 2019, third schedule (7), and PLUPA regulations 2020. This is just the start of our work to protect public spaces. We are committed to identifying, surveying, and planning for all public lands in the county to ensure they are used as intended."

In the first phase of the project, data was collected and reports were prepared. Draft PDPs have now been shared with stakeholders for feedback.

Kiambu County's CECM for Lands, Housing, Physical Planning, and Urban Development, Ms. Salome Wainaina, announced the completion of the local land use plans in a recent Gazette notice. She stated that "copies of the plans are available for public inspection at the sub-county Physical Planning Offices and

the Office of the Director of Physical Planning in Kiambu town, Red Nova building."

Ms. Wainaina also noted that copies have been sent to Subcounty Administration offices so that anyone interested can review and give their input.

The next steps include further review by various government agencies. Feedback from stakeholders will help refine the final PDPs to ensure they reflect both community needs and regulatory standards. Once stakeholders' input is incorporated, the final version will be submitted to the Cabinet Secretary in charge of Lands and Physical Planning for approval.

PDPs are crucial for guiding structured and sustainable development. PDPs promote a healthy balance between economic growth and environmental sustainability. This approach creates stronger communities that grow in harmony with their surroundings.

Informal settlements get the much needed facelift under Governor Wamatangi in Kiambu

In the heart of Thika Municipality, the Kiangómbe informal settlement, once neglected, is now filled with hope and opportunity.

Residents are happy with the installation of new integrated solar streetlights. The event, was graced by Governor Kimani Wamatangi.

The highlight of the day was the unveiling of 65 solar-powered streetlights, part of the second Kenya Informal Settlement Improvement Project (KISIP 2) by the Kiambu County Government. These lights aim to improve security, reduce crime and boost the local economy by allowing businesses to operate for longer hours and ensuring safer streets for everyone.

Governor Wamatangi has shown a strong commitment to upgrading slum areas across the county. Earlier this month, he commissioned 125 solar streetlights in Bosnia (Githurai) and Fort Jesus (Ruiru), as well as 30 grid-connected lights in Misri (Limuru). The project, awarded to Amanta Construction Company Ltd, will include walkways, streetlights, and drainage systems.

Kiangómbe will receive 1.77 kilometres of tarmacked roads with 85 solar streetlights. Misri will benefit from a 1.5-kilometer road and 75 solar streetlights, while Fort Jesus will have 1.8 kilometres of new roads and 35 streetlights. Bosnia in Githurai will get a 1.6-kilometer road upgrade and 89 streetlights. Umoja will have 0.6 kilometres of link roads with 53 streetlights.

Residents expressed their gratitude. Caro Mburu from Misri said, "These lights will allow businesses to stay open longer, boosting productivity and improving security."

Peter Shitamani, a tailor from Fort Jesus, added, "Better lighting will reduce crime and help businesses grow. The new roads will also make transportation cheaper and easier for us."

These projects, funded by the World Bank and the Agence Française de Développement (AFD), aim to uplift informal settlements by improving security, mobility and living conditions, creating a more vibrant future for the residents.

Chief Officer of Housing, Mr. Daniel Njenga, emphasised that these streetlights symbolize not just better infrastructure, but also safety, opportunity, and hope. He urged residents to protect the lights from vandalism, reminding them that these improvements are for their benefit.

In the two years since Governor Kimani Wamatangi took office, he has focused on youth empowerment and developing sports in Kiambu County. His administration, through the Department of Youth Affairs and Sports, has introduced programs aimed at improving skills, entrepreneurship, job opportunities and sports infrastructure.

Youth Empowerment through Skills and Entrepreneurship: One of the key achievements is empowering young people with skills and entrepreneurial opportunities. During the Kiambu County Youth Day celebrations, themed “Green Skills for Youth: Towards a Sustainable World,” Governor Wamatangi led discussions on important topics like digital skills, recycling, sustainable fashion, climate change, and renewable energy. A young entrepreneur was even given a contract to supply brooms to the county, showing how the county supports youth businesses.

Understanding the importance of digital skills, his administration partnered with Meta to provide digital and entrepreneurship training. Over 1,800 young people, including small and medium-sized businesses, were trained at county and sub-county levels to help them succeed in the digital economy.

The county also worked on boosting youth entrepreneurship through the Kiambu County Enterprise Development Fund. A study was carried out with input from banks, county partners, and small businesses to create a plan for the fund. The next step is to present a proposal to the cabinet and county assembly to support youth-led businesses.

Youth Employability and Creative Industries: Wamatangi’s administration hosted the first Youth Employability Summit to tackle youth unemployment. Over 80 employers and key stakeholders came together, providing young people with valuable connections to job opportunities.

The county also focused on creative industries, partnering with the Kenya Film Commission to host a six-day Film Capacity Building Workshop. A total of 126 young filmmakers were trained and certified, boosting their skills to compete in local and international markets. The creative arts sector is seen as an important contributor to Kiambu’s economy.

Sports Development: Governor Wamatangi’s administration has made great progress in sports development. Through partnerships with the Football Kenya Federation (FKF), the county trained 180 referees, who now earn some money per game and certified 120 coaches with CAF ‘D’ Diplomas, allowing them to coach FIFA-recognised teams. This has created direct and indirect job opportunities in sports.

The Governor’s Champions Cup, a football tournament, is promoting grassroots football and linking talented players to Kenya Premier League teams. Kiambu athletes have also excelled nationally and internationally through the Talanta Hela Program, with five athletes selected for advanced training and one chosen to represent Kenya in Spain.

Improvement of Sports Infrastructure: Improving sports infrastructure has been a priority. Stadiums in Thika, Kanjeru, Githunguri, Kirangari and Thigio are under construction, while Kagwe Stadium has been fully upgraded. These facilities will support the county’s athletes and encourage more participation in sports. In addition, the county has distributed sports equipment, including footballs, basketballs, volleyballs, and uniforms, to over 800 teams, promoting physical activity and community engagement.

Support for Small Businesses: Around Thika Stadium, 450 business stalls are being built, which will increase the county’s revenue and contribute to the sustainability of the sports facilities.

The transformation of Kanjeru Stadium in Gitaru Ward is moving forward smoothly under the Department of Youth Affairs and Sports. The contractor is already on site and construction is progressing well after adjustments were made to the Bill of Quantities to ensure the right quality and amount of work needed to complete the project.

Currently, drilling for the first stage of the six pavilions is underway using the pile method. This involves using a machine to dig 15 metres deep to make sure the columns are securely placed.

While construction continues, the Department has set up Rungiri Dam Playing Field in

Gitaru Ward, Kabete Sub-County, as an alternative space for sports. China Road and Bridge Corporation helped with back-filling, and the Department levelled the ground to make it suitable for play.

Once Kanjeru Stadium is completed, it will have two football fields: a main field with a standard running track and spectator stands, and a second field for training. There will also be two tennis courts and a basketball court.

Other sports grounds under active development include Thika Stadium, Thigio Grounds, and Kirangari Grounds. At Thika Stadium, construction is going well, with the basketball court 98 percent complete. The unfinished spectator stands for the football field have been com-

pleted, and work on more stands is about to begin, with the stadium expected to hold 15,000 spectators.

Around the stadium, 450 business stalls are being built to help small-scale business owners. These stalls will also boost Kiambu County's revenue, which will support future sports facilities for the community.

At Thigio Grounds, during a visit by the County's top leadership, led by CECM for Youth Affairs, Sports, and Communication, Ali Osman, it was reported that levelling and backfilling were progressing well. Once finished, the field will feature an 11-a-side football pitch with AstroTurf, an athletics track, and a viewing dais.

The second phase of grading and leveling at the Kirangari Vo-

ational Training Centre's playing grounds in Nyathuna Ward, Kabete Sub-County, is also ongoing. Murram is being added and compacted, and AstroTurf will be installed. The work will include new changing rooms, a washroom block, and fencing.

In an interview with The Kiambu Report, Mr. Osman expressed his satisfaction with the progress and asked the residents to be patient. "Under Governor Kimani Wamatangi's leadership, we are committed to delivering excellent sports facilities that will encourage our youth to pursue sports and raise the sports standards in the county.
